FROM THE ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR'S DESK



Dear Brothers in Christ:

It is hard to believe that it is September already and our hot summer is fading into the past! It seems that September can be one of the busiest months of the year as people come back from vacation and get back into the regular work flow. Since the last Beacon a lot has been happening so I will try to provide you with a brief update on several topics.

The formation community actually got an early start getting back into the routine since our classes resumed on August 21st. Our intent was to have a class the last weekend in August and end our year in November so that men could focus on Advent activities in their parishes. That plan was expanded when we used the 21st of August as a make-up day for the "snow day" last February. What a contrast we saw between the February and August weather!

Prior to our break a total of 27 Deacons attended the Deacon Mentor orientation sessions and are now certified to mentor our Aspirants and Candidates. Appointment letters from the Archbishop to that effect will be sent soon. For those of you who are willing to mentor men in formation we will be offering the orientation program again on October 9th and October 23rd from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. at the St. Stephen Center. Mass begins at 8:00 a.m. on both dates. If you are interested in being a Deacon Mentor or continuing to be a Mentor and have not attended the orientation session, please plan on coming to one in October. Please register for these sessions with Phillis Curry at pcurry@archatl.com. The class counts toward our continuing education obligations. To my brothers in the class of 2008, starting in February you will be able to serve as a Deacon Mentor so attending the class in advance will prepare you for that service.

This year Archbishop Gregory sent a letter to all Deacons asking that they engage their Pastors in a discussion about any men that they feel might be called to the Permanent Diaconate. Often Deacons are the first to see the good work that a man is doing in the parish and community. By bringing the man to the attention of the Pastor, his name can be submitted to the Archbishop so that the man and his wife can be invited to the Information/Inquiry sessions. If you have not already done so, please take some time to reflect on men in your parish who may have a calling to the Diaconate and speak with your Pastor about him.

We now have a date for the Admission to Candidacy (class of 2015) and Institution of Acolyte (class of 2013). Bishop Zarama has asked us to combine these two into a single liturgy which will be held on January 20, 2011 at 7:00 p.m. at Holy Vietnamese Martyrs Catholic Church. Please put this on your calendar.

As always, there are more things happening than we have space to describe in the Beacon. If you have any questions or comments about formation or for that matter anything else that I may assist you with, please don't hesitate to call or send an email.

You remain in my prayers and the prayers of our Aspirants and Candidates.

Available classes are listed on the next two pages:

CL612 DE: Canon Law for Deacons *New For Fall, 2010!*

This course has been especially designed for deacons and provides an in-depth analysis of those specific canons with which Deacons may become involved. This twelve module course is divided into four broad themes: An overview of this history, purpose, operation, and interaction within the Code of Canon Law; in-depth discussion and analysis of those Canons which are operative in pastoral (parish) settings; Canons relating to the sacramental life of the Church, and those Canons which relate to marriage, including those of interest to those involved in Tribunal work. Designed and facilitated by Monsignor Michael Osborn, JCD, of the Diocese of Kalamazoo, MI, this course has been developed in response to many requests from the members of the National Association of Diaconate Directors, and from deacons throughout North America.

PA951 DE: Good Practices in Parish Administration *Also Open to Priests and Parish Administrators!*

This course provides priests, deacons and parish administrators with a comprehensive overview of civil, legal and financial issues which may be encountered in a parish setting. It also provides a structured overview of various scenarios likely to be present in a parochial setting, and does so in both the context of civil and canon law. Topics addressed include: overview of civil law, contracts, negligence and premise liability; land use and zoning, employment law, worker's compensation and unemployment compensation; civil law regarding marriages and families, festivals, bingo and games of chance; casinos, game-nights and liquor liability, tax exempt status, confidentiality and privileged communication; protection of children, and financial management. This course has been developed and reviewed by experienced attorneys, accountants, and pastors.

MO 841 DE: Medical and Health Care Morality for the Diaconate

As a deacon, you may frequently be asked to assist the faithful as they grapple with emotionally charged medical issues. This course will present fundamental Church principles relating to health care morality and medical ethics that will provide you with confidence as you are called upon during these discussions. This course studies the theology of the human body, personhood, and human dignity in protecting life from beginning to end and in treating illness. This course will be of particular interest to deacons involved in hospital, nursing home, ministry to the aging, or other similar settings, and to those deacons who have completed our course in Hospital Ministry and who desire an in-depth examination of Catholic moral principals on this topic. Deacon Pete Gummere, a microbiologist and long-time writer and commentator on Catholic moral theology, and a deacon of the Diocese of Burlington, VT will return to facilitate this course during the upcoming term.

PA 868 DE: Pastoral Counseling for the Deacon

This course presents basic counseling theory, processes and skill development, focused on assessment, listening, and goal setting. This course briefly outlines various emotional/mental disorders which may assist the non-professional counselor to make appropriate assessment and professional referral. This course is specifically designed for those deacons in pastoral settings who have come from other disciplines, and aims to introduce students to a variety of tools, strategies, and methodologies. Special emphasis will be placed upon helping the deacon recognize some common issues and problems which they are likely to encounter. Personal counseling styles will be addressed as a means of enabling each participant to understand his or her own strengths and weaknesses in a pastoral care setting. This course will permit the deacon to identify the critical differences between pastoral care and professional counseling, particularly as it relates to the nature and limits of the pastoral counseling task. This course will also assist the deacon to understand the elements of the counseling process and gain experience of elementary counseling interventions through practice and role-play, and to help learners to understand their own personal style of relating and its influence on the counseling process. This course will also introduce deacons to a wide range of helpful resources relating to pastoral care and counseling. This class will be facilitated by Deacon Bob McCormick, a retired educator and deacon of long service in the Diocese of Rochester, NY. This course will be come a required pre-requisite for Hospital, Prison and Family Ministry courses in 2011

PA967 DE: Prison Ministry for the Deacon

This course is specifically designed for those deacons involved or with interest in ministry to the incarcerated. It has been developed by a cadre of deacons, each of whom is a full time employee of a correctional facility, as well as an experienced chaplain. It addresses issues which are specific to local, state or federal correctional facility. It will enable a deacon to:

- § Employ appropriate programs and demeanor as a volunteer or contract chaplain within a correctional setting.
- § Identify basic correctional procedures within Federal, State, and Local penal institutions.
- § Examine and differentiate inmate mentality.
- § Differentiate the role of a Catholic chaplain from an institutional chaplain.
- § Provide effective Catholic services - liturgical and educational.
- § Discuss the limits of confidentiality within counseling and basic religious counseling method

Deacon Robert Werner, a full time employee of the Bureau of Prisons at the Federal Medical Corrections Center in Fort Devens, MA, will return to facilitate this popular and most useful course.

SP 611 DE: The Spirituality of the Deacon

With particular emphasis on the formation and ministry of permanent deacons in the United States, this course correlates the sources, principles and practices of sound spirituality with the fundamental truths of Catholic faith, with the reality of human nature as redeemed and graced, and with practical aspects of spirituality in diaconal ministry. It highlights development of sound spirituality in the context of the Church and emphasizes the need for, and spiritual benefits of, ongoing integration of spiritual reading, personal prayer, private devotion, liturgical worship, and pastoral practice throughout a deacon's ministry to the faithful. We are fortunate again to have Monsignor Christopher Schreck, PhD, STD, of the Diocese of Savannah, GE as our facilitator for the fall 2010 term.

Guest Writer's Thoughts (New Feature)

"The Church as Missionary"

One of the things that excited me as a seminary student in Rome was that the Church emphasized that by her very nature the Church is missionary and our call to discipleship is a call to be missionary. For this reason and many more I put great emphasis on mission trips. This summer my parish, St. Ann, sponsored five mission trips (two for middle school students, two for the high school students and one for college students).

Two of the groups attended a Catholic Heart Work camp that really enriched them with a new awareness of our call to service. Another group went to New Orleans to help continue the clean up after Hurricane Katrina and another group stayed and worked in our own parish. The college students went to El Salvador. Being my first time there I had no idea what to expect. It was not long before I realized that God had pointed us in that direction and a love affair between the poor of El Salvador and our students blossomed.

The college students worked with Project FIAT organized by Sister Gloria, a Handmaid of the Sacred Heart. Members of her religious community are doing great ministry work in our own Archdiocese of Atlanta. The students worked hand and hand with the people in a very poor barrio building a Day Care Center. We did not have one power tool and you could hear the picks and the hoes bouncing off the dirt that was as hard as cement. Right now, many parents have to lock their children in their homes in order to keep them safe when they go to work. We also organized a quasi-bible school for the kids of all ages. We worked, prayed and shared together and everything about how the college students and adults worked together exuded their care. There was no doubt that it was all about, "Whatever you do to the least of my brothers and sisters you do unto me."

One of my highlights of the trip was celebrating Eucharist for our group at the altar where Archbishop Oscar Romero was shot and killed. It was an experience that is very difficult to put into words. He has always been an example and inspiration for me and so many other priests. He gave his life for the poor and we joined with him during those eight days doing as much as we could do for the people for whom he died.

Students, who go on mission trips, leave their comfort zone and shed all those things that seem so necessary (cell phone, iPods, computers, T.V. and even fast food). I am extremely proud of the youth of our parish. They enrich and enliven the Church locally and wherever they go as ambassadors of Christ.
